Chair's Report

East Timor Hearts Fund has an incredible history of supporting Timorese people affected by rheumatic heart disease and congenital heart disease by delivering cardiac screening clinics in Timor-Leste and bringing patients to Australia for life-saving heart surgery. Since starting in 2010, we have saved the lives of more than 100 patients through heart surgery.

2022 was a year of evolution as we strengthened our foundations for greater impact. In the last few years we have collaborated with Timorese and international health organisations on innovative projects such as developing and implementing the Timor-Leste RHD Guidelines. The Guidelines provide evidence-based guidance for clinicians for the diagnosis, treatment and prevention of acute rheumatic fever and rheumatic heart disease. Such initiatives have been truly embraced and championed by the Timor-Leste Ministry of Health and local health organisations as a real game changer for the healthcare system and community. It is a game changer because of the potential positive flow on impact. By equipping Timorese clinicians with the skills and capacity to reduce the burden of rheumatic heart disease, they become the change agents to reach more patients now and in future.

Through such initiatives the Board saw an opportunity to build on our legacy while strengthening programs that build local capacity to prevent and treat rheumatic heart disease. In line with the Board's strategic plan.

The first of these investments was to increase our operational skills. The Board was delighted to appoint Jane Papasergio as our new CEO in February. We also welcomed a new board member, Peter Walton who is the CEO of CARE Australia. Jane and Peter bring an incredible depth of experience in international development in Asia and the Pacific.

Training clinicians and improving health care systems within a developing country takes time. While we started investing in 2022, the momentum of our change impact will likely be realised in later years as we continue to look for ways to achieve the greatest impact. It is, therefore, important for us to stay focused and continue to pursue opportunities to walk together with the Timorese people to build their capacity to affect real, sustainable change.

CEO's Report

After a couple of challenging years with COVID-19 border restrictions in both Australia and Timor-Leste, it was wonderful to be able to start our cardiac screening clinics in Timor-Leste again in April, and bringing patients to Australia for heart surgery in May.

When I first joined East Timor Hearts Fund in February 2022 I had heard of the amazing work of our volunteer clinicians and partners in Timor-Leste. It was incredible to witness this first hand when I joined a cardiac screening clinic in Dili. It was also heartwarming and inspiring to welcome our patients to Australia, and see how surgical intervention transformed not only their lives, but those of their families and loved ones too.

I continue to be inspired by our life-changing work and the opportunities for even greater impact. Projects such as our early prevention penicillin programs provide monthly penicillin to 426 patients to prevent their rheumatic heart disease from getting worse. Or how we are supporting the socialisation of the Timor-Leste RHD Guidelines so that clinicians can be trained to identify, prevent and treat acute rheumatic fever and rheumatic heart disease.

I'm looking forward to ETHF developing further partnerships and supporting the expansion of programs to allow a greater impact on prevention and capacity building. This will enable us to help achieve our mission of reducing the burden of rheumatic heart disease.

Due to more than two years of COVID-19 restrictions, we had a backlog of patients needing surgery. We addressed this by bringing 10 patients to Australia to receive life-saving surgery, which resulted in an increase in our operating costs.

While COVID eased in 2022, the softening economy and increase in cost of living created new challenges and negatively impacted our fundraising. We've also brought more patients to Australia amidst this. I have been especially heartened by the continued support of our generous donors. Thank you to everyone who supported our organisation. Without you, our life-changing work would not be possible.

I would also like to thank the Board, Finance and Clinical Governance Committees for their leadership and dedication to our organisation. And lastly our small core team for their hard work and support.

2022 Highlights



April

The first in-country cardiac clinic in two years was held after COVID restrictions eased.

Program Impact - Education & Prevention

To have the most effective reach and impact, we partner with local healthcare organisations to deliver Rheumatic Heart Disease programs in a broad range of health settings including hospitals, Community Health Services, Health Centres, and SISCa centres (integrated health service program in the community).

Education and awareness programs

ETHF supports the delivery of a range of education and awareness programs for health workers, family members and the community about the dangers of rheumatic heart disease and how they can detect and prevent it.

A key education program is the socialisation of the Timor-Leste RHD Guidelines and RHD Patient Held Medical Records (PHMR-RHD) which were developed in 2021 by healthcare partners including ETHF, the Timor-Leste Ministry of Health, Maluk Timor, Menzies Health Research and St John of God (SJoG).

The RHD Guidelines and related training modules provide evidence-based guidance for clinicians for the recognition, diagnosis, treatment and prevention of acute rheumatic fever and RHD. By training clinicians our aim is to help them identify patients with ARF and RHD early, so patients receive treatment early and improve their health outcomes.



The PHMR-RHD enables healthcare workers to document patients' medical visits. Patients can carry it with them to every medical appointment. This promotes consistent record keeping of patient visits for better continuity and quality of care. It also encourages greater patient responsibility and autonomy in their healthcare journey.

In 2022, we continued to support the socialisation and training of the RHD Guidelines and PMHR-RHD in five districts: in Aileu, Baucau, Bobonaro, Dili and Ermera.

Early prevention program

Our early prevention program provides patients with monthly penicillin injections or oral doses over several years to prevent their disease from getting worse. Without access to the penicillin program, patients' rheumatic heart disease will deteriorate. They may develop other health complications and eventually will need heart surgery. However, heart surgery is significantly more costly and is a more invasive procedure than the penicillin program. Also, heart surgery isn't currently available in Timor-Leste and patients must travel overseas to countries such as Australia for surgery.

For the penicillin treatment to be most effective, patients should receive penicillin as early as possible after diagnosis, and consistently keep up with their monthly doses.

Some patients struggle to travel to a clinic regularly because they live in a rural or remote area. Others may need encouragement to continue their course of medication. To increase the likelihood of patients continuing with the program, penicillin clinics are delivered in a range of locations. Home visits are also conducted to engage hard to reach patients and healthcare staff provide support and information to patients and their family.



Program Impact - Diagnosis & Treatment

Cardiac screening clinics

During 2022, East Timor Hearts Fund held three cardiac screening clinics: in April, July/August, and October at HNGV and HOREX Baucau. Our team of volunteer Australian clinicians partnered with Maluk Timor, HNGV and HOREX Baucau to conduct 262 patient consultations, of which 85 were male and 177 were female.

During the clinics, the team reviewed current RHD patients as well as assessed newly referred patients. We consulted with patients on their medications, penicillin, doses, family planning options. We also identified patients who needed cardiac surgery and recommended the type of surgery they would need.

Initiation of primary care for patients who were too fearful to get vaccinated against COVID was an important benefit for patients attending the clinics. A very common theme encountered during the clinics was that of patients not being vaccinated against COVID due to concerns regarding vaccines causing heart damage.

Reassurance was provided to patients that they would be much safer with some protection against COVID. The Maluk Timor team have also been comprehensively liaising with all patients to ensure they are protected.

During the clinic, our team used the RHD medical record book to document the patient's healthcare visits. Patients can take the record book with them to every health facility to keep an accurate record of important information for continuity of care. The clinical team also used the RHD Guidelines, developed in collaboration with the Ministry of Health and HNGV to ensure treatment complied with the national treatment requirements.

Patients who live in rural and remote areas and could not afford to travel to a clinic were offered a small travel allowance to enable them to attend.

By the end of clinic held in October, there were 34 patients on our waitlist requiring cardiac surgery.

Cardiac surgeries

During 2022, East Timor Hearts Fund provided life-saving heart surgery in Australia for 10 adult Timorese patients. Eight of the patients were female and two were male. Six patients underwent Percutaneous Mitral Balloon Valvuloplasty procedures and four patients underwent open heart surgery. All patients returned to Timor-Leste with good outcomes following their surgery.

The surgeries were conducted by Australian cardiologists who have volunteered with East Timor Hearts for several years. East Timor Hearts Fund partnered with Maluku Timor to brief patients and manage their travel to and from Australia.

The patients were accompanied by a Timorese Patient Escort from either Maluku Timor or East Timor Hearts Fund. The Patient Escort provided guidance and support for patients as well as acted as translators to patients and clinical teams in Australia.

By the end of December 2022, we will have 28 patients on our waitlist requiring cardiac surgery.

Ricardo

Ricardo is a thirty three year old father with three children. He has been living with rheumatic heart disease since he was 14 years old. Our cardiologists diagnosed him with critical aortic valve stenosis. His heart disease prevented him from doing many things. "It really affected by dreams because whatever activities I did would be limited."

Ricardo had been on our surgery list, for a few years due to COVID travel restrictions. In late November he travelled to Australia for open heart surgery and is now recovering well.

Maria

Maria is a mother to five young kids including six-week-old twin boys. Since childhood she suffered from severe rheumatic heart valve disease. At seven months into her pregnancy Maria developed heart failure putting her life and both of her unborn twins at risk.

In late May Maria received life-saving heart surgery at St John of God Hospital Geelong. She's now enjoying doing the simple things we take for granted – like playing with her children.



Investing in greater impact



This year, the East Timor Hearts Fund Board approved a three year strategic plan (from 2022 to 2024) to have greater impact by reducing the number of people in Timor-Leste affected by acute rheumatic fever and rheumatic heart disease. The four goals that underpin the plan are:

1. Help grow the capacity of health providers in Timor-Leste to deliver quality heart healthcare.
2. Support assessment clinics and life-saving heart surgery whilst building heart disease prevention and education programs.
3. Partner with leading local organisations to reduce the burden of heart disease in Timor-Leste.
4. Strengthen our organisation and grow our community of supporters including multilateral funders (e.g. the United Nations), bilateral funders (e.g. Australian Government), corporates, trusts and foundations.

In 2022, we started investing in the resources and expertise necessary to lay the foundations for greater future impact and bring the plan to life.



Since ETHF started, we have had a small core operations team has been based in Australia. Two years ago, we hired our first employee based in Timor-Leste. Then in September 2022 we welcomed our second employee in Timor-Leste. In future, we aim to continue increasing our operational presence in Timor-Leste to grow our programs and impact. This may include establishing an ETHF office in Timor-Leste and/or strengthening collaboration with local healthcare partners.

Our strategic plan is informed by The [Timor-Leste] National Health Sector Strategic Plan 2011-2030 which emphasises the need for an ongoing focus on improving health systems management and developing skills in health professionals. Therefore, to best support Timorese people to reduce the burden of rheumatic heart disease, our plan prioritises capacity building of local healthcare professionals, with an emphasis on delivering heart disease prevention and education programs.

The ETHF team has been collaborating with our local partner Maluk Timor to explore expanding existing programs such as socialisation of the RHD Guidelines and the penicillin early prevention program.

We have also been consulting with the Ministry of Health and local healthcare organisations to develop programs targeted at different groups of patients and clinicians. For example, ways to support women and children who are at greater risk of developing RHD. Or tailored training modules for Timorese cardiologists.

Developing and delivering new healthcare programs will involve intensive time and resource commitment to navigate systems and build relationships of mutual trust in the early years. It also involves trialing ideas, learning from and strengthening them. This means that the impact of our investment in 2022 to 2024 is expected to be greater in future years.
